

The award of the Nobel Peace Prize to the survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki is an encouragement to develop our struggles for a world without nuclear weapons.

The Mouvement de la Paix welcomes the award of the 2024 Nobel Peace Prize to Nihon Hidankyo, the Japanese organisation of survivors of the US atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945, which campaigns for the total elimination of nuclear weapons. This award is an encouragement to continue the fight to ensure that the 9 States possessing nuclear weapons (1), including France, sign and ratify the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (CTBT), which enters into force on 22 January 2021,

The award of this Nobel Peace Prize rewards Hidankyo's work for a world without nuclear weapons. It is also a further recognition of the work accomplished by all those whose struggles to date have made it possible to win the CTBT.

This success was achieved thanks to :

- The joint mobilisation of people throughout the world, most often at the instigation of survivors of atomic bombings and victims of nuclear testing.

- The support of the 122 States that adopted TIAN at the UN in July 2017,
- The 94 States that have signed the TIAN and the 75 States that have ratified it,

- The work of the UN, which supports and accompanies these struggles, for example through the UN International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons (26 September each year).

On 6 and 9 August 2024, the Mouvement de la Paix (Peace Movement), in its intervention (through its national spokesperson) at the conference against the A and H bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, alongside representatives of Niha Hidankyo, reiterated, in an international appeal, its determination to act so that the total elimination of nuclear weapons - 'dangerous, costly, illegal and morally inadmissible weapons of mass destruction' - becomes the united and priority struggle of peace movements throughout the world.

On a national level, the Mouvement de la Paix, as part of France's 2025 budget, is taking action to drastically reduce spending on nuclear weapons in favour of social budgets, public services such as health and education, and to protect the planet.


The current world situation carries with it the risk of nuclear weapons being used. This is why the Mouvement de la Paix intends to act, in the coming weeks and months, to develop a new global momentum for the elimination of these weapons, enabling us, in the wake of the 8 million signatures obtained by the survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, to obtain tens of millions of signatures for the total elimination of nuclear weapons, as was the case with the Stockholm Appeal in 1950.

The Mouvement de la Paix, alone and as part of the national collective of peace marches, will continue to lobby the President of the Republic and all members of parliament with determination, to ensure that France stops violating international law by not respecting its commitments under Article 6 of the NPT and signs and then ratifies the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.
